






Question One

All EHS and HS programs must train all governing body, policy council, management, and staff who determine eligibility on eligibility policies and procedures within 90 days of being hired or seated.



Question One Answer

Part 1302

Subpart A- Eligibility, Recruitment, Selection, Enrollment, and Attendance

FALSE

1302.12(m) Training on eligibility.

- (2) A program must train management and staff members who make eligibility determinations within 90 days of hiring new staff.
- (3) A program must train all governing body and policy council members within 180 days of the beginning of the term of a new governing body or policy council.



Question Two

A program must maintain appropriate ratios during all hours of program operation, except for brief absences of no more than five minutes and during nap time when replaced with one staff member or trained volunteer who does not meet the teaching qualifications required for the age.



Question Two Answer

Part 1302

Subpart B- Program Structure

TRUE

1302.21(b) Ratios and group size.

- (1) Staff-child ratios and group size maximums must be determined by the age of the majority of children and the needs of children present. A program must determine the age of the majority of children in a class at the start of the year and may adjust this determination during the program year, if necessary. Where state or local licensing requirements are more stringent than the teacher-child ratios and group size specifications in this section, a program must meet the stricter requirements. A program must maintain appropriate ratios during all hours of program operation, except:
- (i) For brief absences of a teaching staff member for no more than five minutes; and,
- (ii) During nap time, one teaching staff member may be replaced by one staff member or trained volunteer who does not meet the teaching qualifications required for the age.

A program that serves American Indian and Alaska Native children may integrate efforts to preserve, revitalize, restore, or maintain the tribal language for children into program services.

Subpart C- Education and Child Development Program Services

TRUE

1302.36 Tribal language preservation and revitalization.

A program that serves American Indian and Alaska Native children may integrate efforts to preserve, revitalize, restore, or maintain the tribal language for these children into program services. Such language preservation and revitalization efforts may include full immersion in the tribal language for the majority of the hours of planned class operations. If children's home language is English, exposure to English as described in §1302.31(b)(2)(i) and (ii) is not required.

- (1) A program must use program funds for the provision of diapers and formula for enrolled children during the program day.

Question Five Answer

Part 1302

Subpart E- Family and Community Engagement Program Services

FALSE

1302.51 Parent activities to promote child learning and development.

(b) A program must, at a minimum, offer opportunities for parents to participate in a research-based parenting curriculum that builds on parents' knowledge and offers parents the opportunity to practice parenting skills to promote children's learning and development. A program that chooses to make significant adaptations to the parenting curriculum to better meet the needs of one or more specific populations must work with an expert or experts to develop such adaptations.



Question Six

EHS and HS programs must provide any necessary modifications to the classroom and individualized accommodations and supports necessary to support the full participation of children with disabilities.



Question Six Answer

Part 1302

Subpart F- Additional Services for Children and Disabilities

TRUE

1302.61 Additional services for children.

(a) Additional services for children with disabilities. Programs must ensure the individualized needs of children with disabilities, including but not limited to those eligible for services under IDEA, are being met and all children have access to and can fully participate in the full range of activities and services. Programs must provide any necessary modifications to the environment, multiple and varied formats for instruction, and individualized accommodations and supports as necessary to support the full participation of children with disabilities. Programs must ensure all individuals with disabilities are protected from discrimination under and provided with all services and program modifications required by section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act (29 U.S.C. 794), the Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.)18, and their implementing regulations.

EHS and HS programs must implement strategies and practices to support successful transitions for children and families.



Question Seven Answer

Part 1302

Subpart G- Transition Services

TRUE

1302.70 Transitions from Early Head Start.

(a) <u>Implementing transition strategies and practices</u>. An Early Head Start program must implement strategies and practices to support successful transitions for children and their families transitioning out of Early Head Start.

1302.71 Transitions from Head Start to Kindergarten.

(a) <u>Implementing transition strategies and practices</u>. A program that serves children who will enter kindergarten in the following year must implement transition strategies to support a successful transition to kindergarten.

1302.72 Transitions between programs.

(a) For families and children who move out of the community in which they are currently served, including homeless families and foster children, a program must undertake efforts to support effective transitions to other Early Head Start or Head Start programs. If Early Head Start or Head Start is not available, the program should assist the family to identify another early childhood program that meets their needs.

EHS programs that provide services to pregnant women must transition the infant into center-based care.



Question Eight Answer

Part 1302

Subpart H- Services to Enrolled Pregnant Women

FALSE

1302.82 Family Partnership services to enrolled pregnant women.

(b) A program must engage enrolled pregnant women and other relevant family members, such as fathers, in discussions about program options, plan for the infant's transition to program enrollment and support the family during the transition process, where appropriate.



Question Nine

EHS and HS programs must ensure that each staff member has a health examination that includes screeners or tests for communicable diseases every year.



Question Nine Answer

Part 1302

Subpart I- Human Resources Management

FALSE

1302.93 Staff health and wellness.

(a) A program must ensure each staff member has an initial health examination and a periodic re-examination as recommended by their health care provider in accordance with state, tribal, or local requirements, that include screeners or tests for communicable diseases, as appropriate. The program must ensure staff do not, because of communicable diseases, pose a significant risk to the health or safety of others in the program that cannot be eliminated or reduced by reasonable accommodation, in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.



Question 10

EHS and HS programs do not have to report a child safety incident to the Office of Head Start if it has already been reported to the governing body and policy council.

Subpart J- Program Management and Quality Improvement

FALSE

- 1302.102 Achieving program goals.
- (d) Reporting.
- (1) A program must submit:
- (ii) Reports, as appropriate, to the responsible HHS official immediately or as soon as practicable, related to any significant incidents affecting the health and safety of program participants, circumstances affecting the financial viability of the program, breaches of personally identifiable information, or program involvement in legal proceedings, any matter for which notification or a report to state, tribal, or local authorities is required by applicable law, including at a minimum:
- (A) Any reports regarding agency staff or volunteer compliance with federal, state, tribal, or local laws addressing child abuse and neglect or laws governing sex offenders;
- (B) Incidents that require classrooms or centers to be closed for any reason;
- (C) Legal proceedings by any party that are directly related to program operations; and,
- (D) All conditions required to be reported under §1304.12, including disqualification from the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) and license revocation.

Program Instructions & Information Memorandum

A **Program Instruction (PI)** addresses a specific requirement that Head Start grantees and delegate agencies must implement in their programs.

3 TIPS ON HOW TO READ THE HEAD START PROGRAM PERFORMANCE STANDARDS

1. **Study the rule's structure**. The Head Start Program Performance Standards final rule is devised into parts, subparts, and sections. Each section "§" contains paragraphs.

Example: PART 1302 PROGRAM OPERATIONS

Subpart I Human Resources Management

§1302.90 Personnel policies.

(a) In general.

2. **Understand paragraph structure**. There are no such things as subparagraphs. One paragraph could flow for up to 6 levels.

Level 1: (a), (b), (c), etc.

Level 2: (1), (2), 3), etc.

Level 3: (i), (ii), (iii), etc.

Level 4: (A), (B), (C), etc.

Level 5: (1), (2), (3), etc.

Level 6: (i), (ii), (iii), etc.

- 3. Follow paragraph structure sequentially when you read.
 - a. Always begin at Level 1.
 - b. Look for words of authority like, "may" versus "must" and for logical connectors like, "and," "or," "if," "except," "when," and "unless."
 - c. Pay particular attention to punctuation. Pause when you see a comma and stop when you see a period.
